TRAFFIC IN TOWN

The number one complaint in almost every town in Marin County is traffic. In Ross, the Police Department does its best to address top areas of concern with a special focus on traffic. The PD uses a modifiable and informal traffic plan, that provides guidance and service based on the needs of residents and the resources available. Ross officers check the daily flow of traffic and how it impacts the town and modifies its response accordingly. Regularly requested enforcement in areas near schools, Sir Francis Drake Blvd at Bolinas Avenue, Allen Avenue, Laurel Grove near Canyon Road, and Norwood Avenue are also factored in. Wellington Avenue at Baywood Drive is also now a part of the regular patrol. The goal is to calm traffic, reduce stop sign violations, and create behavior changes that will contribute to safer roads for everyone.

Parking difficulties come and go with construction, school, and special events. The PD works with residents, event planners and contractors to establish a balance and find what works, within the law. Healthy and vital downtown and safe neighborhoods are the goal and highly promoted. Enforcement of parking issues can be complicated by private streets and the limited ability to enforce some California Vehicle Code laws. However, the town has a robust Municipal Code that provides guidance and authority for enforcement on private roads. The Town of Ross is fortunate to have a great Department of Public Works who assist by painting faded red zones and repairing existing signage. The goal is to allow access for residents and first responders. Parking questions or illegally parked cars should be reported to the dispatch center at 415-453-2727.

With the weather getting better, expectations are that the weekend bicycle groups will return to enjoy Ross's downtown and the beautiful local roads. The PD reached out to bicycle advocate

groups in Marin County and asked them to share the message of safe and responsible riding, with an emphasis on following the rules of the road. Schools and children have also been asked to share the mission of "Ride Safe in Ross." You may see students wearing glow in the dark wristbands as a reminder!



Fire-Smart Tips from the UC Master Gardeners



April: Assess Your Fire Risk

When you evaluate your fire risk, think lean, clean, and green.

Lean landscapes

- Plant with appropriate spacing between plants
- Separate clusters of plants from each other with pathways of non-combustible materials

Clean landscapes

- Remove dried grass, weeds, dead branches, and all other dead vegetation
- Check gutters, roofs, eaves, vents, chimneys, and under decks for leaf and needle litter
- ♦ Thin and reduce branches from dense tree canopies

Green landscapes

- Keep your plants healthy with proper irrigation, and check your irrigation system regularly for leaks or malfunctions
- ◆ Apply compost and mulches to help stabilize soil temperature and prevent evaporation, keeping soil moist and healthy


Laurel Grove Phase IIB Project Moves Forward

Town Council gave the go-ahead last night to advertise the next phase of the Laurel Grove Safe Pathways project for construction bids. "Laurel Grove Safe Pathways Phase IIB" will extend the recently completed Phase IIA roadway and pedestrian pathway improvements from the intersection of Monte Alegra up to and including the intersection of Canyon Road.

The project consists of 12,250 square feet of restored pavement, a new concrete retaining wall with decorative façade, new lane striping, and signage. 360 feet of pedestrian pathway will be constructed from the terminus of the existing pathway across from Monte Alegra to a location just opposite the Canyon Road intersection. Construction is planned to begin mid-June of this year

and will be completed before school starts in the Fall of 2024.
